Bavaria

In October, about forty people from the Bavarian congregations met again for three days in Haus Freudenberg to prepare for the conference in Dortmund 2022.

This time the theme was "Speak just one word...". We tried to create an "open space" in which we could find the themes we wanted to engage with. In listening and sharing, we tried in three steps to *condense* the contents together, to make them a *reality*, to bring them to *life*. This work was enlivened and complemented by joint artistic activity in eurythmy. From this condensation, a wide variety of themes emerged, which were then exchanged in individual discussion groups. For example, one group dealt with the topic: I do have human dignity, but in the Act of Consecration I am spoken of as an unworthy creature and at the same time at the beginning of the Act of Consecration the motif of the worthy, common accomplishment is heard, I still have great difficulty in understanding this in the right way.

Further thoughts on this and the other topics, such as the "Four Stages of Listening", will not be elaborated here, but will contribute to the enlivening of the conference in Dortmund.

"Can you imagine becoming a coordinator in our region and working with me?" I was asked this question by the lenker of our region, Mr von Wehren, last autumn. At the same time, I was given the management of the East Germany Corporation. The working atmosphere is very pleasant and the tasks are varied and exciting. Besides the daily routine work, I try to get to know the communities little by little. I try to attend the respective annual meetings as well as conferences, to get into conversation with the people and to help them deal with their problems. Topics that concern me are, for example, the pros and cons of income pooling, transparency and consolidation of municipal budgets as well as the regional budget for better planning. I am happy to be a part of the movement for religious renewal and want to make my contribution.

Farewell to Plauen in the Saxony Vogtland, new beginning in Hirschberg!

Last year we met with 12 priest colleagues in Plauen and then in Hirschberg, including the leaders for Bavaria and Central Germany, Harry Lohse and Andreas von Wehren. The town of Hirschberg is situated on the Upper Saale in the triangle Thuringia/Saxony/Bavaria and thus on the border between Bavaria/Thuringia, our regions Bavaria/Germany Central and former GDR/BRD. It was a mutual impulse of the meeting to look at the large "border region", which includes the municipalities of Nuremberg and Würzburg in the south and, Gera, Jena and Chemnitz in the north. In the summer of 2021, there was a big joint summer festival of the surrounding congregations and peoples from the wider rural region to develop a common awareness, also across the triple border.

About three years ago we started from Plauen to celebrate the Act of Consecration of Man in longer intervals in the Kultur-Villa-Novalis in Hirschberg. Because of the Corona situation we were grateful for the beautiful large rooms and could now visit regularly. The decision was subsequently taken to give up the rented rooms in Plauen and to continue the Christian Community in Hirschberg with renewed and growing forces. Active contacts and mutual visits have already developed with the friends in Hof, Bayreuth and Wernstein.

In the next few weeks we will say goodbye to the rooms, the place and the spiritual companions in Plauen in a small ceremony in order to pitch the "church tent" anew in Hirschberg. This step was not easy for all of us, after almost 90 years of Christian Community in Plauen, many caring priests from the surrounding area and a supportive small community. The joy of coming together "across the border" in the future and work to unfold new potentials along the old border strip, makes us happy and gives us courage for the future!

Founding of the congregation in Berlin-Kladow: In 1995, the Havelhöhe Hospital in Berlin-Kladow, located in the very south-west of Berlin west of the Havel on the Wannsee, passed from public purse to the non-profit Association for the Promotion and Development of Anthroposophically Expanded Healing Art e.V. Berlin.

Soon pastoral care for the sick began by priests from the two Berlin congregations. In 2001 religious lessons were offered in the Waldorf School, founded the previous year on the same site. In September 2002, the first Act of the Consecration of Man service was celebrated in the ecumenical prayer room of the clinic, and two years later the Sunday service for children was celebrated for the first time. People gathered one Saturday a month. Little by little, vestments, antependia, and later even cloaks and casulas were sewn. Gradually, the community grew and an initiative group was formed. During Easter tide of 2015, the service could finally be celebrated for the first time, so that we became an affiliated congregation of Berlin-Wilmersdorf. Since autumn of the same year, we have been able to gather for worship, weddings and baptisms in the multi-purpose hall of the hospital. The congregation grew, with 20 to 30 people attending one Sunday a month, and up to 50 at Christmas. In 2017, the Gold Fund, founded and run by Johannes Lenz, gave us our own chalice. Devotions in the hospice and in the neighbouring nursing home were established. Various small working groups emerged.

Two years ago, the initiative for an independent church saw the day of light. With the strong, energetic and encouraging guidance by the priest Susanne Gödecke, we made the necessary preparations. Renato Gomes from Brazil was sent to our congregation, on the 2nd Sunday of Advent he was introduced by the leader Andreas von Wehren and welcomed by the congregation.

We still have to work out a final constitution and financial independence. At the same time, plans to demolish and rebuild the hall we have been using so far have forced us to look into the question of finding our own premises. Great Britain-Ireland

On the first Sunday in Advent, 28th November, 2021, we made a major change to the translation of the ritual texts that we use in the region. After many years of discussion, we have decided to change all instances of Thee, Thou, Thy and Thine to You and Your. We also changed 'yea' to 'yes'.

We were aware as we discussed making these changes that for some members they will come as something long overdue, whilst others would rather that we had not made them. In two rounds of consultation, one in 2018 to 2019 and one this year, we have sounded out the congregations on questions relating to this change. It was useful to hear what had been discussed in the congregations when we worked on the translations at the synod.

The international leadership has given it over to each of the English-speaking regions to work on the translations as they see right for their local area, recognising that there are differences in the way words are used and understood within the English-speaking world. However, the lenkers are agreed that it would be desirable to have a unified version for the whole English-speaking world. Although this was not a motivation for making the changes that we are undertaking, we are glad that regarding this very major difference, the British English version is now in harmony with the other three English-speaking regions (North America, South Africa and Australia-New Zealand).

North- and Northwest Germany

Questions are more beautiful than answers

From 8 to 10 October, people from different congregations met in Hanover on the theme of *Economy and Christianity*, interwoven with the youth conference *Money or Life*. Both events served as preparation for the big jubilee meeting *Consecrating Humanity* during Michaelmas in Dortmund in 2022.

A small group of volunteers found the participants mainly by word of mouth. The number of posters and flyers was kept small, as it was not certain how many people the Community hall would be able to accommodate because of physical distancing restrictions. Due to a shortage in the host community of Hanover, a group of helpers joined from Bremen and tirelessly provided food, drink and merriment.

The contributors were all very good and well-known professionals, legitimised by their strong practical backgrounds, which was clearly noticeable. Nevertheless, there was already a surprise on the opening session when the speakers candidly explained: What Christianity really had to look for in the economy or to seize as opportunities in it, not even they did know. So, they took a different approach: They asked the participants questions and they were able to discuss the issues amongst themselves. This continued over the next few days: group discussions again and again, even in the midst of the lectures, along with Vital-Eurythmy, singing and conversations in pairs. The artistic exercises were not 'decoration' or a 'loosening up', but they prepared the way for listening skills and mindful speaking.

The motto working for each other - learning from each other - living together did come true. All speaking was loosely joined, there were no results to settle any issues. But people went home curious and with many addresses exchanged.

It seems to me that thoughts nevertheless emerged that could become wilful ideals. One of them is that economic activity based only on profit and efficiency is running itself to death. A more Christian approach would be to ask what our fellow human beings need. This does not mean that we have to consume ourselves in selflessness, but our own work becomes more meaningful and refreshing when the question of the other lives in us. This also included the fact that something trinitarian appeared in all conversations: At the conference, a trinity was experienced everywhere – not only in the sense of the threefoldness of the social organism: in the human being in body, soul and spirit, in the divine world as Father, Son and Spirit, in the conversation: You - I - a truth alive between us. Common dualities suddenly became suspect, such as the opposites of good and evil, rich and poor, etc., which tend to lead to moralising and strong judgements.

Even the participants with well-known names did not appear as the 'great speakers', but also received gratefully. So, the path was once again taken a step further: The Christian community increasingly sees its task in the communion between congregants and priesthood and a wider public to offer a space for conversation.

Southwest Germany

Half a year has passed since our last report and we were faced with the task of closing a painful gap: For many years, Mr Thomas Gerber worked for the interests of the Christian Community and was the coordinator of our Southwest Germany Region for more than 20 years. His illness and death in May of this year has left a painful gap.

We are therefore very happy that in this situation Mrs. Jutta Rother was willing to immediately sift through the existing documents and take care of the tasks at hand. She has familiarised herself with the matter with great commitment. Since she is also prepared to continue to take care of the upcoming responsibilities, she was elected as the new coordinator on 30 October 2021 at the regional meeting in Constance. The main focus of her work will be the regulation of finances and economic matters of the region. In other areas, the Regional Council wants to be more involved in future and share the responsibilities.

We have also entered a process of some reorganising: In the coming spring, Hellmut Voigt will hand over his responsibility to his successor Irma Beridze-Gössler, currently priest in the Karlsruhe Congregation, after more than ten years as the region's leader.

We have also started to invite guests from the responsible bodies of the congregations in Southwest Germany, in order to make the work of the Regional Council transparent and also to enable further strengthening of the body. In spite of this significant change, 'impulse' days were taking place as planned in the autumn (31.10. to 1.11.): "Christianity – an existential challenge" – One's own connection with the Risen One – What is strong? What is weak?

About 50 participants, among them several priests, found dedicated hosts in the members of the affiliated congregation in Wahlwies with the support of the local Waldorf School. This allowed for an open atmosphere of exchange, characterised by many conversations. Some enthusiastic singing brought momentum into the community. Both the seriousness of the present situation and impulses for the future found their expression. It became clear that the next 100 years of the Christian Community are about to begin and that it is up to each individual to contribute to this.

The Offenburg congregation has now moved within the Waldorf School and now meets in a well-proportioned room that is also accessible by lift. The long-term goal, however, remains to have its own rooms.

In 2005, Vicke von Behr succeeded Taco Bay as Erz-Oberlenker. Every year at least one ordination was prepared here. Seminary/Hamburg

Life at the seminary in 2021 was particularly marked by, among other things, the fact that we held three preparatory courses. Ten new priests have been working in their congregations since their ordinations in February in Berlin, and in October in Berlin and Warsaw. With a current group of five candidates, we are moving towards the ordinations in March 2022 in Berlin. In December, the 2nd course "Study for Professionals" is rounding off and we look ahead with the students to the internship phase, which for the first four students will be followed from May 2022 by the preparatory course for the ordination during the big conference in October in Dortmund.

This year, for workload reasons, it has become necessary for us to suspend the full-time training for quite some time. Moreover, due to the Corona restrictions, it was not possible to open the seminary for guests and visiting students, which was probably a reason for a low demand for full-time studies. We used the free time for concentrated concept work in the leadership team. After a learning process in spring 2022, we will summarise the formulated ideas into a presentation for differentiated considerations, with accents on basic study, the methodology of joint study and a possible cooperation initiative with regional partner organisations. The new start for full-time training is planned for the winter semester 2022/2023.

In April 2022, the 3rd course in "Studies for Professionals" will begin. At the beginning of October, we presented our new guidelines at an orientation day, and since then there has been the opportunity to obtain more detailed information in person and telephone conversations. We are looking forward with anticipation, after our initial discussions and some firm registrations, to the introductory module (22.4. to 8.7.2022), and the emerging group of part-time students. In these days we are expecting from the printers the "Christmas Gift 2021", which this year contains an essay by Jörgen Day with the following title: *Accompanying the dying on their way into another life*. The author, a priest emeritus of the Christian Community in Hamburg, has gained a wide range of experience in the field of end-of-life care: He was involved in the founding of a care service and an outpatient hospice facility and has led a training course for end-of-life and dementia care. In the preface, the following thoughts refer to the great connection between dying and the incarnation of Christ:

The apostle Paul writes that with the burial of the body we sow a mysterious and seminal seed: "An earthly body is sown, a supernatural body is raised" (1 Cor 15:44). In this way he takes up the parable of Christ, who symbolises the completion of his journey into the Incarnation in the image of the seed: "Unless the grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (Jn 12:24).

The Christian year begins with such a seed: The child, who finds no more suitable place than the stable in Bethlehem for his birth, becomes the seed of a new beginning for the perishing world. The path of the child born in poverty leads to the painful death on the cross, but when his body is laid in the tomb on Golgotha, the image of the grain of wheat begins to be fulfilled. Worldwide Encounter

Encounter - a sentiment that concerns people more and more. But since we have all been living with the Corona pandemic, on the one hand the desire for encounter is more noticeable and on the other hand the thought of encounter can also be frightening.

The experience of encounter played an important role on my trip to get to know the Argentinian congregations in autumn 2018. During my three weeks there, I was always put up privately. The encounters on this trip were very warm and moved me deeply. Back in Germany, an idea slowly

developed: In the way I experienced the people of the congregations in Argentina, the Christian community could – in our globalised world – grow closer together in encounters that create more awareness through the unfamiliar, unexpected and heartfelt experience in the You. As Steiner describes it in GA 175: "With every human encounter there is linked a true spiritual process." How is that supposed to work, "worldwide encounter"?

The decentralised form is important: There is a proposal for an organisation, whereby each congregation has its representative who acts freely within his congregation, so there is no global centre, only a list of representatives of all congregations worldwide. Only this list of representatives is to be kept up to date. Each congregation that wishes to participate is actively involved through its representative. In this way, a system of promoting encounters within the Christian community – worldwide and reliably available worldwide – is built up (more details: please request the flyer by email).

Perhaps one will only meet once, or perhaps return visits will follow, in any case a network of profound human experiences will be created, which will give the Christian community of the future a new kind of foundation and renewed strength. Already 17 congregations worldwide are successfully carrying this project forward into the future. Flyers are available in German and seven other languages.
