Traveling Priest Lecture Tour

One new initiative in the North American Christian Community is a traveling priest lecture series. The purpose of the tour is to reach places where The Christian Com-



munity does not yet have a presence, and to contribute some thoughts to the larger cultural conversation. These talks are designed to reach out across the board (i.e. not just for Christian Community/Waldorf or Anthroposophical audiences); we are hopeful that they can be very helpful and thought provocative for many different people, and that these talks can also serve as an outreach for those less familiar with esoteric concepts and ideals. Lark Bergwin-Anderson of the DC/Baltimore congregation is organizing the tour. Rev. Richard Dancey will begin touring the southeastern US, beginning in Washington DC, and continuing on to North Carolina, and Florida. Not yet scheduled as of this writing are Georgia, Tennesse and South Carolina.

Lecture topics include:

- The Anonymous God: Moving from Faith and Words to Inner Attitude and Deeds
- The Challenge of China: America's Task... The Transformation of Work
- The Transubstantiation of Money: The Spiritual Economic Crisis of Our Time

- Christ, Karma, Reincarnation: Are Christ, Karma and Reincarnation Compatible?

• Strengthening the Spiritual Life of Children: How do children grow up strong in spirit, soul, and body in this technological culture?

On a recent weekend, there was a basketball tournament at the Green Meadow Waldorf school in Chestnut Ridge, NY. Five different schools came together for this event. All of a sudden there were squeals of joy as a circle of friends recognized one another and ran together for hugs and greetings. These were the "camp children" who have known one another during the first weeks of August for many, many summers.



The Christian Community Camp on the East Coast is now in its 39th year. The children of former campers are plentiful. "What IS it?" the parents and friends ask, that makes this camp so special? What is it that goes so deep into the children's hearts?

The most concise and truthful answer is this: it is the Creation of Harmonious Community Life, in living action. We can dream all we like about a new and better world, but camp creates it, in a small but impressive way. The days have a rhythm, which compliment and harmonize the human being. They include nutritious, delicious food, chores, stories, artistic work, singing, nature, wild games, sports, laughter, reverence and gratitude.

There are the usual frustrations of living with other people. We strive to be an example of working through difficulties through conversation and patience. There is no one thing, no element that can be singled out as the most important, except this: Behind everything we do, there lives and weaves a consciousness of Christ as the Sun Spirit. This is no exclusive religion, but acknowledges that He belongs to the whole earth and can

enter all human souls, regardless of nation or religion. It is this understanding that can bring about world peace. Our counselors often exclaim: "Why can't life be like camp?" Why indeed? We have to begin somewhere with models that work!

Consecration of Church in Odessa

Some twenty years ago a civil engineer from Odessa in the Ukraine named Lyudmila traveled to Moscow on business. In the evening hours one of her colleagues invited her to a lecture about renewing religion, given by a man from Germany. Curious, and encouraged by the freedoms newly blossoming after the collapse of the Soviet Union, she went to the lecture. And after that, she didn't rest until this same man came to Odessa

to speak about this topic and get some religious renewal going in her city. The man, Rev. Dieter Hornemann from Stuttgart, had already been traveling to the (then) Soviet Union for several years and speaks fluent Russian. From then on he traveled regularly to Odessa. More people joined the small group of interested souls. After many



years of meeting in the Waldorf School and growing into a respectable affiliate (of Stuttgart, Germany!) the community was able to purchase a piece of land with a small house on it in a fairly quiet street. Various visitors from Western Europe (including the author with a youth group) visited Odessa in order to help renovate and remodel the house so that it could serve as a

temporary church until the building plans could be carried out. In the fall of 2004, members and priests from several countries got together to lay the foundation stone for the new building. Three priests were sent to work permanently in this huge, Russian-oriented city on the shores of the Black Sea. The complete story of this building process with all its twists and turns could fill a novel; suffice it to say that in the budding democracy Ukraine, with little experience at independently organizing anything, one complication followed another, until finally on October 3, 2010 the consecration of the chapel could take place. And a joyful celebration it was!

Guests from Poland, Russia, Germany, Norway, Georgia, Austria, Belgium, Holland and the US joined the Odessites and the



Ukrainians from other cities for a weekend of festive gatherings, building up to the consecration ceremony on Sunday morning. Having arrived on Thursday, I had plenty of time to walk in and around the building, admiring its simple organic forms, the dignity of the chapel, and the practical arrangement of the other gathering spaces. Much of the interior is not finished and will not be for a while, but if ever a community was ready to take on and ensoul its building, it's the Odessites! Their enthusi-

asm got all of us into a festive mood, complemented by thankfulness for the many contributions from a number of countries. On Friday evening the priest of the Odessa congregation, Andrej Ziltsjov, summarized the turbulent history of the whole building project and thanked the many people who played various roles in the building process, from the architect right on to the men still working inside and outside to get the grounds ready for the weekend. Saturday was dedicated to preparing ourselves inwardly for the consecration. Three priests from the West gave contributions about the Michaelic nature of religious work in our times. We practiced a speech choir to accompany the consecration ceremony. In the evening the Lenker for the

East European countries, Jaroslav Rolka, gave a lecture describing the consecration. On Sunday morning all the chairs were put to one side. The visitors from western countries stood along the walls, the Russian-speaking members and friends stood in the middle. Reciting alternatively from the works of Cyril and Methodius and the St. John Prologue, West and East met in the realm of the Word to prepare the chapel for the consecration. Then the Lenker with the servers celebrated the consecration, sprinkling consecrated water in the four



directions, calling on the elements of earth, air, fire and water to contribute their specific forces to our work, then the same with the incense. One had the impression that a very real presence descended upon the congregation and filled the room with a very positive spirit, a blessing for the work that will be taking place in this chapel and in the whole building. In many ways a pioneer, the Odessa church is the first church built for the



Christian Community in a Slavic speaking country.

In the week following the consecration, around forty of us traveled to the Southeast shore of the Crimean peninsula, where The Christian Community owns a café, which doubles as a conference center. There we strove to give a strong impulse to the inner work in the Ukraine by contemplating the Sermon on the Mount. Imagine experiencing the daily Act of Consecration of Man while the breakers of the Black Sea

are gently crashing into the shore fifteen feet away! Working together with people from Ukraine, Russia, Germany, Belgium, Holland and even one lone American, we built a small temporary community which hopes to give an injection to the larger, very diffuse band of people in this huge country who are work-

ing towards renewal of religious life.

The next international conference in the Ukraine will take place in the second or third week of October 2011. As I hope to take part and contribute once again, it would be great if a number of participants from our region would travel along. Besides the conference, there will be an opportunity to visit the city of Odessa, where our church with its active community is located. If you are interested, please contact Rev. Report from the Regional Board of The Christian Community

The Regional Board presented its annual financial report and offered for re-election Bob Heberton (treasurer) and George Riley at the 2010 Annual General Members Meeting during the Delegates Conference. The 2009 financials were accepted, and the contributions for 2011 (based on 2010 income) will continue at the same level. In recognition of the growing needs for the near future, a suggestion was made from the floor to raise the level of contributions, but the delegates confirmed the proposal from the Board to keep it the same this year.

The Delegates Meeting was warmly hosted by the Taconic-Berkshire community November 4-7, 2010. The responsibilities for retired priests and their spouses continue to be upheld, even though the economic situation in the world is so precarious. We seem to be able to go forward in a creative middle realm somewhere between sinking and swimming! But the courage to look forward with confidence is bolstered by the strength and enthusiasm of the congregations of The Christian Community!

The whole conference for delegates, into which the AGM is embedded, was nourishing on the spiritual, social and physical levels. Rev. Michael Brewer gave two wonderful talks on the Threefold Social Order, bringing innovative perspectives from lectures by Karl Koenig in Man As a Social Being. With archetypal pictures based on biblical stories, we began to realise how spiritual life looks back to the past (the archetype of Abel), to the Paradise before the



Fall; how economic life works to plant seeds for the future (Cain); and how the institution of the legal sphere may look to the work of Seth, the third son of Adam and Eve, for its founding impulses. Wonder, compassion and conscience are the guiding virtues for the spiritual-cultural, the legal-rights (relationships between people), and the economic life. The Lord's Prayer and the events of Holy Week also offer profound insight into the practise of the Threefold Social Order.


Inspired by the lectures, we could turn with all the more joy to the artistic workshop choices, entering into the Calendar of the Soul through the medium of pastels or enlivenment and joy in movement. A spontaneous evening of improvisation—including individuals from the audience!—brought the added spice of life for an altogether wonderful conference.
